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From the President

Sad news: Recently on August 20 we unfortunately had to say goodbye to comrade Christian van der Linden. He was only shortly a member of RCL005 (since 2018) and had to give up the fight at a young age (46) after a serious illness. Jan van Loo, a close acquaintance of Christian and myself attended the funeral on behalf of RCL005. Christian was active for many years to obtain information about, among others, Canadian and English crew members of warplanes shot down in WW2. That is why he was a member of a working group that did historical



research in the municipality of De Ronde Venen on Allied and German crashed aircrafts. He was also a member of the national Air War study group. We hereby lose a driven and expert comrade, but his family and relatives have lost so much more. We wish them a lot of strength in this difficult time. We will remember him.

Board meeting RCL005: At the board meeting of August 7 it was decided that a Membership Committee will be established to meet a number of requirements and wishes of the board, but certainly also the members of RCL005. You should not only consider administrative and financial responsibilities, but also one of the objectives of RCL e.g. stimulating and guaranteeing solidarity within the association. CHRISTIAN VAN DER LINDEN

JUNE 30, 1973 - AUGUST 20, 2019

On August 24 we received the sad news that our comrade Christian van der Linden passed away at the age of 46 after an unequal battle. Christian had only recently (since 2018) become a member of RCL Branch 005 but had been active for many years to obtain information about, among others, Canadian and English crew members of war planes shot down in WW2. He had been able to make contacts with living crew members and with relatives. The following is written in the death notice:

Done so much,
Done so much,
so much to do.
The fight is over
with new courage,
amazingly powerful.
It is now done,
that's alright!

We will remember him as a very dedicated comrade. LEST WE FORGET. The cremation has taken place on Monday, August 26. A delegation of RCL Branch 005 was present.

AGAIN "SOVEREIGN'S MEDAL FOR VOLUNTEERS".

On August 31, 2019, prior to the Sail-Past because of the commemoration of the Battle of the Scheldt 75 years ago, four persons received an award for their special merits to Canada. The location was very special: aboard the Canadian ship HMCS St. John's. The distinguished ones:

Alice van Bekkum, chairman of the foundation "Faces to Graves" and member of RCL005;

Albert Hartkamp, former board member of "Thank You Canada and Allied Forces" and member of RCL005:

Marc Fraser, chairman Celebration National Holidays Holten;

Paul D. Schouten, Captain in the Royal Dutch Army.

On the recommendation of H.E. Sabine Nölke, Ambassador of Canada to the Netherlands, were awarded the first three lucky ones with the "Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers" and the last with the "Meritorious Service Medal - Military Division, all for their extraordinary commitment to Canada and its people.

The medals were awarded by the Governor General of Canada, H.E. Julie Payette, who had come aboard the ship especially for this. A select group of RCL005 was present. We congratulate the decorated people and are proud that two more members of RCL005 were rewarded for their commitment.

After the ceremony, the Governor General and the Canadian Ambassador left for Terneuzen to attend the opening of the liberation program by members of the Dutch and Belgian Royal Family.

At the invitation of Col. Tim Young, Military Attaché of the Canadian Embassy, a large group of guests was aboard the HMCS St. John's for the Sail-Past, including members of RCL005. This turned out to be an exciting experience, more of which can be read and seen in this RCL005 Newsletter, on our FB page and soon on our website.

A big thank-you to Colonel Young and Sergeant Jo-Anne Wiseman with their team and last but not least, to the crew of the HMCS St. John's for their hospitality.

In the Netherlands we have the **Silver Rose**, introduced by the Army in 1994 as a tribute to the home front. Later expanded for all veterans of a military unit. They can apply for a Silver Rose for only one mission.

My question to you, reader, is this sufficient recognition? Or, sorry to mention: is it Dutch frugality?

Personally, I think it's very austere. One Silver Rose for 3 or 4 missions for example?
