

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EDITORIAL FEEDBACK.

As previously comrade Ruud Janssen has written:

At the end of a year, many people look back on the past period.

(By the way: Thank you Ruud for protecting me against a "slip of the pen")



As writer/editor of the RCL Newsletter I try to look ahead as much as possible.

But once a year I also want, or have, to look in the rear-view mirror.

On one hand to evaluate what has happened within our foundation, on the other hand to see whether it has elicited reactions from the readers.

2021 was the year that, little by little, seemed to open up some possibilities for our primary mission:

Encouragement and Support of Commemorations and Remembrance.

I write on purpose" it seemed to open possibilities". It was quickly overtaken by reality. The already limited programs were soon adjusted or postponed again.

What we DO want to mention here are a few things that have NOT appeared in a Newsletter so far. In the 2021-02 edition we mentioned:

L/Cpl Howard Reginald Myatt and Major Hugh Philip Falloon.

Both, posthumously, appointed Knights 4th Class in the Military Order of William. Responses have been received to this topic.

Howard R. Myatt has a final resting place at the Canadian War Cemetery in Groesbeek (XI.D.2) His tombstone does not mention the high Dutch decoration. At the Canadian cemetery in Holten however for Cpl. J.W. Campbell a new headstone was placed with the additional text on it.

My motto is: ,,credit where credit is due", so I decided to bring this up. I contacted Sgt. Jo-Anne Wiseman of the Canadian Embassy. As part of her position, she has had a number of conversations with CWGC authorities last summer. She reported the omission on Myatt's tombstone. The feedback was that the adjustment of the tombstone was only possible after a request from relatives of the fallen. The challenge lay with us again.







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On the website Ancestry.com I found a family tree that mentioned Howard R. Myatt. Several names were shielded because it concerned persons who are still alive.

I contacted the person who published the family tree and emailed him why and what I was interested in, especially Howard R. Myatt.

There was a response very quickly. It turned out that the originator of the family tree had contact with the Myatt family. He wrote that a younger brother and sister of Howard R. are still alive and he would forward my mail. Almost by return mail came a message from Raymond Myatt. I have informed him of my action. The attention for his older brother who had never returned touched him deeply.

The current status:

Dear Mr. Sligman,

Thank you for the information in your message. I have contacted Diane Nkeze at the Canadian War Graves Commission in Ottawa. They have acknowledged my letter and have advised that my request will be forwarded to the Western Europe area and Central Representative Team who are covering Netherland. They have advised that it can take up to 20 working days for me to receive a reply unless it is a complex request which may take longer. I don't believe this is a complicated request and I will be following up with them to see what the status is in a couple of weeks time.

Thanks for all your help and I will keep you posted.

From an assistant curator, Michael Nickerson, of the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada museum. He had also served with the QOCHC.

He himself had set up a search for a fallen from World War I; a great-uncle of former UK Prime Minister David Cameron.

In doing so, he had contacted a retired librarian, Mrs. Marina Alexander.

That turned out to be a golden opportunity for him.

She had sent him articles about the regiment, including the death/funeral notice for Major Falloon.



OBLTUARY.

MAJOR H. P. FALLOON.

The funeral took place on Friday last week, at Waldershare Cemetery, of Major Hugh Philip Falloon, of the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada, grand-nephew of the late Rev. Hugh Falloon, of Temple Ewell, former Vicar of Christ Ewell, former Vicar of Ways 5th, 1945, at No. 4 Canadian General Hospital, Farnborough, of Wounds received at Deventer North Helling In the same grave as his sister, who was killed on active service in 1942. The mourners present were:—Mrs. Falloon (mother) Miss Stalloon (Coolderry), Dr. and Mrs. J R. W. Richardson. Also present were: Mr. A. Kouyoumdjian, Messrs. Lloyd and Groome (representing Edmonds and Co., Wood Green, N.), Mr. Porter, N.F.S. (representing Mr. V. Lomas), Mr. Claud Watson and Miss Watson, Capt. Collin Watson, the Matron, R.V. Hospital, Waldershare. The following attended from the Queen's Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada, the deceased's regiment:—Major J. J. D. Gagnon, Capt. D. W. R. Dodge, Capt. A. C. S. Williams, Lt. H. Comack, Lt. W. G. Neill, Lt. O. W. Anderson. The bearers were all 2nd-class warrant officers of the Highland units. The coffin was draped with the Union Jack. The hymn, "My God. my Fatner," was sung at the church, and the Rev. K. F. Power, Chaplain at Shorncliffe Garrison, officiated. The Lament was played by a Piper. The "Last Post" and "Reveille" was sounded by a Bugler. The funeral arrangements were by Mr. H. J. Sawyer, of 85, High St., Dover.

Dear Mr. Sligman:

Thank you very much for your article on Dieppe.

I did not know until about two years ago that a fellow electrician that I took my apprenticeship with and that I worked with, has a Dieppe history. His father and his uncle both served with the Cameron Highlanders. His father was taken POW at Dieppe.

His uncle was killed while creating a smokescreen to cover the withdrawal of soldiers from the beach in Pourville.

I have attached pictures of our Dieppe display and I have attached pictures of the wooden German ammunition box containing the 'field files' in Cameron HQ.






Box with "field files"

In response, an email came with the following attachments:





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
Photo of the shadow box.

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LAST MINUTE INFORMATION.

Got information about the document on page 10 at the last minute.

I found a personal message on my Facebook account from someone in my home village.

Thank you Mr. Carlo van den Kieboom.

His cousin in Canada wrote:

The Brantford Armory on Saturday had some of the atmosphere of the Netherlands in 1945.

Twenty Dutch war veterans living in Canada were there to start an organization for sharing experiences, remembering colleagues, celebrating freedom and peace, and, of course, the enjoyment of speaking Dutch.

The group formed Bond van Wapenbroeders in Canada, part of the Dutch League of Servicemen and Resistance Fighters.

The president is Maj. Eugene Roosegaarde Bisschop, a 71-year-old retired regular officer of the Royal Netherlands Army.

"We all have the same thoughts and memories about our service," said Mr. Roosegaarde Bisschop, who was deputy provincial resident of the league and president of the branch in Arnhem before emigrating to Canada in 1981.

Dutch Canadian Legion (Bond van Wapenbroeders) was organized in 1987 by Major (retired) Eugene Roosegaarde-Bisschop, a Dutch emigrant who previously was the president of the Arnhem chapter. It was formed to provide a support network for exservicemen and resistance fighters for psychological trauma, for sharing experiences, remembering colleagues, celebrating freedom and peace, organized outings, and the enjoyment of speaking Dutch. A chapter (afdeling) each was formed in Chatham, London, Toronto, and Hamiton, Ontario (Ancaster is now part of Hamilton). The signatures are from the members or spouses.

Legion supports awarding Victoria Cross to Afghanistan Veteran

Private Jess Larochelle deserving of commendation

OTTAWA, ON, 1 December 2021 – The Royal Canadian Legion is supporting efforts to award a Canadian soldier the Canadian Victoria Cross. It is the country's highest honour for bravery, valour, self-sacrifice and devotion to duty when in the presence of an enemy.

Private Jess Larochelle served in Afghanistan and performed selfless acts to save others during an attack by enemy forces in 2006. Media reports describe a badly wounded and bleeding soldier who returned to his post to prevent further casualties as enemy fighters gained ground. While severely injured he fired multiple M72 rockets, resulting in the enemy's retreat and saving the rest of his section. Two members had already died.

"There is no doubt that Private Larochelle went above and beyond in excruciating circumstances to save his Comrades and serve our nation," says Bruce Julian, Dominion President. "We ask that our military leaders review Private Larochelle's actions with a view to honouring him with this award."



The Legion joins a chorus of others requesting Pte. Larochelle be recognized for his extraordinary service with the Canadian Victoria Cross. He was previously awarded the Star of Military Valour, which is the second highest award for bravery.

The Victoria Cross was established in 1856 and has been awarded to over 80 Canadians. The Canadian Victoria Cross was established on 1 January 1993 and has not been awarded to any soldiers to date.



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




For me personally a very informative
