Commemorations elsewhere.

The fallen of our liberators are not only commemorated in the aforementioned places.

A place that we do not immediately think of is, for example: The General Cemetery in Nes on the West Frisian Island Ameland. Checking the website of the CWGC, we get a long list of names on our screen.

Forty-nine graves are registered by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.

Victims from the Commonwealth countries. Also, from Canada. Six names are stated: "Canadian". Striking detail: five of them are from the Royal Canadian Air Force which is very understandable.

One of them is from the Queens Own Cameron Highlanders of Canada.

The latter name requires further investigation.

Richard Carswell, H/19940, died August 1942, 32 years of age.

When we read the date of his death a bell did ring. Wasn't August 19, 1942 the day of Dieppe Raid? A quick search in the records confirms our suspicion. We find a copy of a letter from March 1943. His sister was hereby informed that Richard Carswell, after initially being reported "missing in action in Dieppe," is officially considered "KIA". Killed in Northern France, washed ashore and buried on a Dutch West Frisian Island. You may find this a long run-up to arriving at a commemoration. So be it.


The bottom line: in many places in the Netherlands, a commemoration is held annually on May 4.

For the second time, the usual big festivals were cancelled. The basic points on the agenda remained. This year hosted by the province of South Holland.

Research Alfred Charles Sheepwash.

Via the Canadian Embassy a request came in from someone asking for support in a search. He had first seen a photograph of his mother-in-law, now 93 years of age, of a Canadian soldier who had visited her home in 1945. She had not only a photo, but also the address details of the time and a pin with a regimental cap badge.







She did not speak the English language and had always kept it secret. Her son-in-law wondered if relatives might be found. Farhat Ghafoor of the Canadian Embassy had already found the family name ,, Sheepwash". However, it concerned a soldier who was KIA and buried in Italy. Not the man to look for. While investigating

further it turned out that the deceased was a brother of THE Alfred Charles Sheepwash.

Frank Rufus Sheepwash had served with the Royal Canadian Engineers and died of wounds received on September 11, 1944.

The cap badge and regimental data for our search matched. It was someone from the 22nd Armoured Regiment known as the Canadian Grenadier Guards. Investigations taught us that Alfred Charles had returned to England and stayed there.

In March 1947 he married Betty L. Jackson in Sittingbourne, Kent, England.

A.Ch. Sheepwash died on August 11, 1986 in Faversham, Kent and his wife on February 3, 2017 also in Faversham, Kent. They had one child, which, given their wedding year, might be still alive. Data from the child turned out to be protected.

We noticed that the Sheepwash family was / is fairly settled in Faversham.

We advised the man who contacted the Embassy to get in touch with the local authorities in Faversham, or as an alternative: try to interest a local newspaper and have them place a call.
