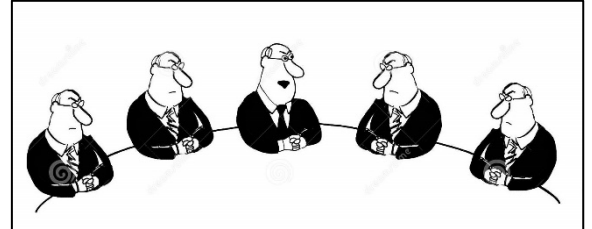


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LETTER OF THE BOARD.

A new monument was unveiled in Ver-sur-Mer for the fallen under British command.

It lists the names of 22,442 who died during D-Day and the battle in Normandy.



The official unveiling could only be attended by a limited number of invitees. About 100 veterans watched from Staffordshire via a livestream connection.



The Prince of Wales spoke by video-link to about 100 veterans and their families gathered in Staffordshire



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In appreciation, the President presented the coin "75-Years of Freedom" to the group.

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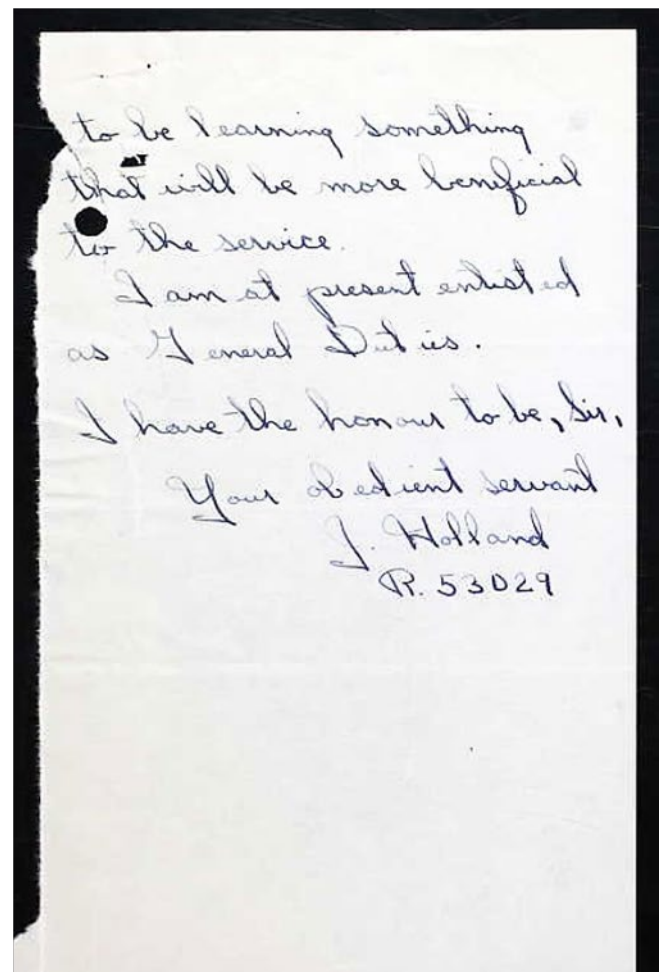
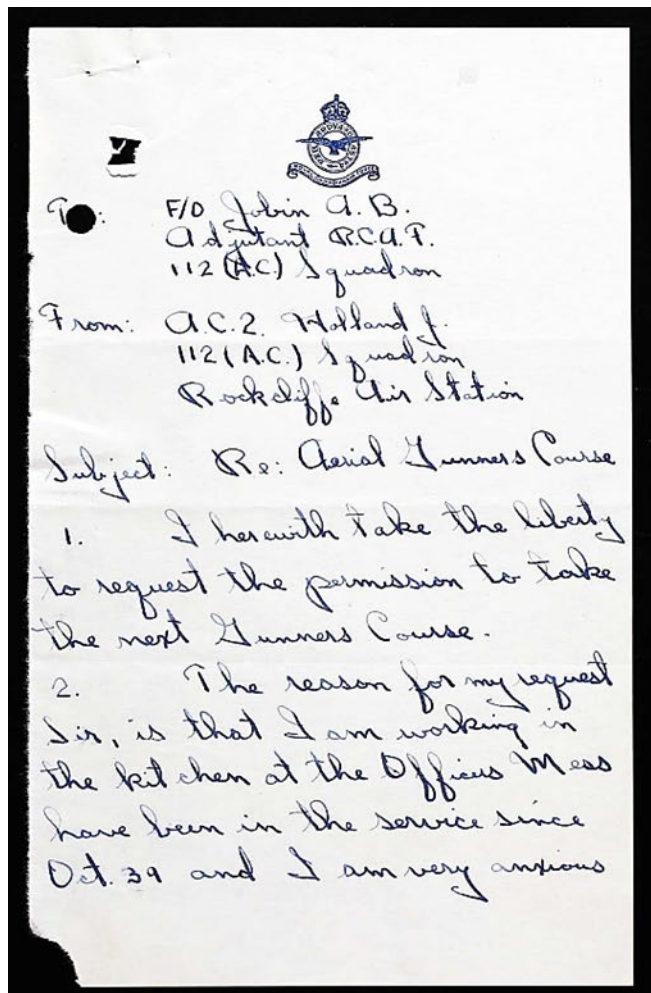
The Flight Engineer of the Halifax was Canadian.

Flight Sergeant Joseph John Francis Holland was his full name, as we found in his records.

We consulted these, purely out of curiosity. In it we found information that we had not encountered before in other records.

A handwritten note in which Holland "applies" for another job within the armed forces. He believes he can make a better contribution as a gunner than as a kitchen attendant in the officers' mess.

He was transferred, because of his technical background he became a Flight Engineer. This meant that his life was ended prematurely. He did not make his 23rd birthday.

From Juno Beach Centre:

Juno Maple Leaves find homes with Jewish Veterans. This past spring the Juno Beach Centre was honoured to gift two Juno Beach Maple Leaf flags to veterans Alex Polowin and Norman Cash.

Mr. Polowin's war was spent at sea, on board several Canadian warships and destroyers including [HMCS Huron](#) while Mr. Cash went overseas in 1941 and landed on Juno Beach a day after D-Day, serving as a gunner with the Royal Canadian Artillery. While both men survived the war, nearly 450 Canadians of Jewish faith lost their lives. Those whose bodies were recovered lie buried in military graveyards across Europe, Africa, Asia and in North America, as well.

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SOMETHING SPECIAL.

Comrade Gerrit Bruggink reported:

"I received some photos that were taken at memorable places in the municipality of Bronckhorst. It turned out that flowers had been laid at the monument in Rha (QOR), at the Resistance Monument in Vorden and on the graves of Allies at the cemetery in Hengelo. (Gld).

I was asked: "why"?

I contacted the Schuppers/Berendsen family and they gave the following explanation:



"On June 17, the mother and grandmother of the Schuppers family passed away. After the cremation, there were beautiful flowers that had no clear final destination. These flowers were placed on the above mentioned spots.

The reason for this was the involvement of Mr. Schuppers in the resistance in the years 1940-1945 in the town of Gorinchem. Like so many, at the risk to their own lives. Like so many others, he had hidden this deep inside. Only after years, step by step, the stories were told.

However, many men and women of the former resistance, took the stories with them to the grave. Therefore, the family brought the flowers to the places mentioned above".

A heartfelt thank you to the family for the respect they showed with this.
