Three Canadian Heroes Will Always Be Remembered by Our Family

Introduction

There are three WWII Canadian air crew members of Stirling Bomber LK131 that lie buried in the church cemetery of Gilze, which has a strong connection to my family!

The Final Flight of Stirling Bomber LK131

The aircraft took off from RAF Tempsford, Bedfordshire on October 31st 1944, at 22:32 hrs for an SOE-operation (drop) to Lage Mierde, Netherlands (code-named: Gerrit 1). The timing suggests the mission would have been in support of the preparations for Operation Market-Garden.

In the early hours of September 1, while flying at a height of 100-150 metres, the aircraft was hit by light Flak of the 3. /Gemischte Flak-Abteilung 591 (RAD) and II. /2. /Leichte Flak-Abteilung 847 and crashed near the airfield at Gilze-en-Rijen in the Dutch Province of Noord-Brabant 19 km WNW from the centre of Tilburg. Only the air despatcher survived, the seven other men, including three Canadians, are all buried at the Gilze church cemetery. Let us remember them and honour their sacrifice!

Sgt Clarence Bowker, Air Despatcher, survived the crash. He was captured and a POW in <u>Stalag Luft</u> 7 near Kreuzburg, (Bankau) Upper Silesia.





The Connection to my Family

Like thousands of other young Dutch men after the invasion, my father became conscripted labour. Due to his skills as a mechanic and machinist, he worked at the German controlled airfield at Gilze-en-Rijen. It is quite possible he may have witnessed or heard the actual incident.

My parents settled in Gilze after the war and raised their family. My second sister Hilda was born in 1948 but died when only two weeks old of "crib death". She is buried in the same cemetery as our brave air crew and is our second family connection to them. I can imagine my parents would have stopped by the graves of the air crew to say a prayer of thanks and to remember their sacrifice. My sister lies in an entire section of the cemetery dedicated to children, a sad reminder of the rate of infant mortality that still existed after the war.

Our family maintains a grave marker to my sister Hilda to this day, and I visit whenever I am in the Netherlands. I will be visiting again this May 2023. I am the final family connection to the air crew, as I also stop for prayers of remembrance and thanks for giving up everything in the cause for freedom and liberation of Holland.

About the Author

Ed Musters is Canadian born to Dutch parents liberated in WWII. My parents along with their 4 children emigrated to Canada in 1961. Ed served in the reserves of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry in the 80s and is proud to be amongst the newest members of the RCL Netherlands.

Chairman of the Historical Association, Joop Schuilenburg, said in his speech that he was happy and proud to have lived in freedom for 78 years.

Mayor Arend van Hout also referred to the war in Ukrain and refugees who are being welcomed in Westervoort. "It is important that we do justice to our liberators. Freedom is not for free. That's why that day in April is so important to us."

Wreaths and flowers were laid at the monument, with students of ,The Ravelijn' assisting. The younger generation was represented by the presence of the ,Dutch Polar Bears'. A foundation that keeps the memory of the events of WW2 alive.

Holten, April 9, 2023.

IN MEMORY OF THE 48TH HIGHLANDERS OF CANADA.

After the failure of Operation Market Garden, the western and northern Netherlands remained occupied territory. Operation Cannonshot, the crossing of the IJssel near



Wilp, was the prelude to the liberation of the western part of the Netherlands.

The soldiers of the 48th Highlanders of Canada regiment are commemorated annually at the Canadian cemetery in Holten.

The regiment lost 20 soldiers including their commander, Donald MacKenzie.







The first part of the commemoration was specific to the regiment's victims.







In the second part of the ceremony all fallen soldiers were commemorated.

The commemoration was organized by the 48th Highlanders of Holland Pipes & Drums. Comrade mr. F. de Graaf is its patron.

His speech was very well struck, in which the connection was made between the past and the present.







Those present included the Defense Attaché of Canada, Colonel Marc LaFortune, the mayors of Rijssen-Holten and Voorst and the deputy mayor of Apeldoorn RCL Branch 005 was present with a delegation and took part in the wreath-laying ceremony.

After the wreath laying, Colonel LaFortune expressed his gratitude and respect for the way in which the memory of the Canadian liberators is upheld in the Netherlands. To the surprise of many: in Dutch.






Vimy, April 9, 2023.

The Canadian encyclopedia writes:

The Battle of Vimy Ridge was fought during the First World War from 9 to 12 April 1917. It is Canada's most celebrated military victory — an oftenmythologized symbol of the birth of Canadian national pride and awareness.





The battle took place on the Western Front, in northern France. The four divisions of the Canadian Corps, fighting together for the first time, attacked the ridge from 9 to 12 April 1917 and captured it from the German army. It was the largest territorial advance of any Allied force to that point in the war — but it would mean little to the outcome of the conflict.

More than 10,600 Canadians were killed and wounded in the assault. Today an iconic memorial atop the ridge honours the 11,285 Canadians killed in France throughout the war who have no known graves.

As usual, on April 9, this year, a memorial was held at Vimy Ridge. Comrades from RCL ,Liberation of the Netherlands' Branch 005 attended the ceremony.

Markelo, April 15, 2023.

80 years ago, three allied bombers crashed within 4 months in Markelo. At the Field of Honour, a commemoration was held.

17 crew members lost their lives and were given a resting place in Markelo.

Although no Canadian crewmembers were among the victims, the Royal Canadian Legion 'Liberation of the

Netherlands' Branch 005 was present, because of the Canadian Regiment ,Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal'.

Especially this year because, on this occasion, the liberation of Markelo was also commemorated. (April 8, 1945)



Prior to the ceremony on the Field of Honour, a short ceremony was therefore held in the center.

,Les Fusiliers Mont-Royal' were honoured at the plaque on the wall of ,The Beaufort', the former townhall.



School children laid flowers and a wreath was laid on behalf of RCL Branch 005. The commemoration was attended by relatives of the victims and representatives of the Embassies and Air Forces of Great Britain, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the Netherlands.









Two 'old timers' of the Royal Netherlands Air Force Historical Flight made a triple Fly-Past.

Pupils from the primary schools in Markelo laid white tulips at the graves.



New was the participation by members of the Corps ,Nationale Reserve', who ensured that wreaths and flowers were presented correctly.

The presence of members of the Royal Netherlands Air Force Group Reserve Personnel, who provided a stylish Guard of Honour and Flag Guard, should not go unmentioned.

Apeldoorn, April 17, 2023.

Every year on April 17th the liberation of Apeldoorn is commemorated at the 'Sluisje' in the Overijssels Canal.

On the night of 16 to 17 April 1945, two men managed, at the risk of their lives, to cross the canal and convince



the Canadians that the Germans had left Apeldoorn and that artillery shelling was not necessary. In doing so, they saved Apeldoorn from major destruction.



After the welcome speech by the chairman of the Vereniging Oud Apeldoorn, the mayor of Apeldoorn spoke. The children of the Apeldoorn Margrietschool had rehearsed a nice role play together.

Special was the story of a Canadian army box in the attic of a house nearby. The box had, not so long ago, attracted the attention of the resident's grandson. On the coffin the name M.L. Brinkman. A real Dutch name but surprisingly no Dutch roots.



After intensive research, Barry Brinkman, a son of this Canadian soldier, was found in British Columbia.

He came over and spoke during the memorial service.

Around 7 pm, a ceremony started in the Oranjepark in Apeldoorn to commemorate the liberation of the city 78 years ago.

About two hundred people attended the ceremony.

The liberation fire was brought up again by members of the AV'34 athletics club. The accompaniment was provided by the showband DAP.



The City of Apeldoorn Pipes and Drums also took part in the procession that brought the fire to the park.

The flame of liberation was handed over to mayor Ton Heerts, who then ignited the liberation fire.

This was followed by the mayor's speech, concluded with a poem.

The children's mayor then took over.

Children from two schools performed songs and read poems about the liberation of Apeldoorn.





Special wreath laying. Groesbeek April 26, 2023.

RCL Branch 005 has been asked by John Desrosiers, Director of Commemorations of Veterans Affairs Canada, to accompany a former Member of the House of Parliament in Canada, Mr. Larry Miller, with his family to lay a wreath at the Canadian War Cemetery in Groesbeek.

This concerns his great-uncle soldier Bertram Isaac Pyke, killed on January 30, 1945 in Kapelsche Veer and buried in Groesbeek. Private Pyke served with the

<u>Argyll and Sutherland Highlanders of Canada (Princess Louise's).</u>

Through the research of Faces-to-Graves, Larry Miller came into contact with Leon Leijtens from Berg en Dal. His grandparents gave shelter to his great-uncle during the Second World War.
