CELEBRATION OF LIBERATION. 78 YEARS AFTER WW2

2023 has again become the year of celebrating our liberation. Many commemorations take place on the cemeteries and at monuments, which reflects what our liberators have done for us.

Because Covid is behind us, many were able to be present again spread across the Netherlands. Our liberators and/or their relatives also frequently used the opportunity to come to the Netherlands again during this period (2023) and celebrate the liberation.



The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 005, 'Liberation of the Netherlands' is the only chartered branch in the Netherlands entitled to represent the Royal Canadian Legion in the Netherlands. Many Canadians praised the involvement of our Branch, for which we thank them very much.

RCL005 is often asked to lay a wreath at commemorations or to pay tribute to our deceased liberators with her Colour Party. The presence of members of the Canadian Embassy in the Netherlands, in particular the Defense Attaché and his assistant, was also very much appreciated.

Below is a brief overview of the period from 3 to May 7, 2023. Details with photos and film will follow separately at our socials.

Huissen. Mai 3, 2023.

Municipality of Lingewaard.

Prior to Remembrance Day and Liberation Day, The Royal Canadian Mounted Police (RCMP) Pipes, Drums and Dancers visited the municipality of Lingewaard.

It crashed nearby on 5 May 1943.




On behalf of RCL Branch 005, a wreath was laid by Suzanne Groeneveld. She is the daughter of comrade Reinier Groeneveld.

No extensive stories: pictures speak for themselves.











When we talk about veterans, a photo of a member of the former Royal Dutch Brigade Princess Irene should not be missing. The brigade was assigned to the 2nd Canadian Army Corps. In the photo below, in the middle: Max Wolff.

Max Wolff was only fourteen years old when the Second World War broke out in the Netherlands. Barely four years later, he was part of the allied armies that liberated France, Belgium and the Netherlands as an interpreter. Wolff, decorated with the French Légion d'Honneur, among other things, is one of the few living veterans of the Irene Brigade.

Laren (Gld), May 7, 2023.

The 1st Battalion of The Black Watch (Royal Highland Regiment) of Canada Pipes & Drums was in Laren Gld on Sunday 7 May, and so was a detachment from Le Régiment de Maisonneuve.

They made a memorial tour, started in the south-west of the Netherlands, along places in the Netherlands where both regiments had fought in WW2.

In our region, the guests, under the guidance of comrade Berry Swarthoff, started their tour in Almen.

A wreath was laid at the monument near ,Het Elmer'.





In the surrounding area 40 Liberators gave their lives.

The place where the Twente Canal was crossed at the time was also visited.

(In the late afternoon of April 2, 1945, the first men of the Royal Regiment of Canada crossed the channel in canvas boats. They moved silently into the meadows as darkness fell. There was not a German to be seen at that time. HS.)



They then visited the private war museum of Christiaan Harkink.

Over the years, Christiaan has collected quite a few objects that keep the memory of WW2 'alive'.

This was followed by a visit to the farm of the Koeslag family.

People in hiding and pilots were received here and helped further. Ap Koeslag had an impressive story about it.










After lunch, the group arrived at the former butterfly garden. Several guests spoke here and Mayor Sebastiaan van 't Erve and Colonel Marc LaFortune of the Canadian embassy unveiled the plaque with the names of the fallen Canadian soldiers.









After the ceremony, the group moved to the church in Laren.

A wonderful performance was given.

There were many interested visitors.

The empty seats in the front did not remain empty. At the time of the recording, many people were still standing in the back of the church to take their places.

A small group commemorated the liberation of Hilversum on Sunday, May 7, at the cemetery. Respect was paid to sixteen men of the Polar Bears.

Thirteen of them died, three days after the liberation, when an ammunition dump exploded when German weapons were handed in Soestdijk.

Three more British soldiers died in the following months. They were given a final resting place at the ,Noorder Cemetery' next to their comrades.

The Polar Bears belonged to the British 49th (Western Riding) Infantry Division and were part of the Canadian troops that liberated Hilversum on May 7, 1945.

Unveiling monument.

On Thursday, May 13, 1943 - 8 minutes to midnight - the Halifax bomber, JB966 LQ-D, took off from <u>Airfield Gransden</u> Lodge.

The aircraft belonged to the Royal Canadian Air Force 405 (Vancouver) Sqdn. (Pathfinder)

It was part of a formation of 442 aircraft.

Mission: Carry out a bombing raid on Bochum (D).

On the way back, the plane ran into problems.

It was attacked by a German night fighter of 8./NJG 1 flown by Hauptman H. Lütje.

Four crew members were able to safely leave the aircraft and were taken prisoner. The 21-year-old pilot, Hugh Donald Beattie, managed to swing to the countryside and Dedemsvaart was spared a disaster.

The three deceased were transported to Balkbrug and given a grave in Oud-Avereest.

In the same night, from the same raid, four other RCAF men died in a crash.
