








FROM THE SECRETARY:

How to avoid that the dignity of a tribute to an Canadian liberator is affected?

PROBLEMS WITH THE ROBERT MOULTON PATH IN WILNIS. (Warrant Officer Robert Moulton RCAF is the pilot of the Vickers-Wellington Bomber NA-K HE 727. He died in Wilnis on May 5, 1943 after a heroic act).



The following action point is included in the 2024 Framework Memorandum of the Municipality of De Ronde Venen.

Preparing and implementing the Vinkeveen-Mijdrecht cycle route:

"With this exploration we look at the possibilities for using the 'Bello path' to be expanded with bicycle traffic."

At first glance, this seems like an exploration that no one will have any problems with. Nothing is less true.

Officially the 'Bello path' does not exist. However, this name does have a historical background. This concerns a former railway track Mijdrecht-Wilnis-Vinkeveen.

Up to now, it has been a beautiful, largely rural hiking trail where many people have a quiet and peaceful walk.

Also, many people consider the path as a cultural heritage.

The locomotive that was used at the time there was called "Bello", hence the name Bello path. However, this name is not official and therefore, there is a possibility that the citizens will be misled. It turns out that the planned cycle path will largely run over the Robert Moulton path that I initiated. At least to the extent that the path runs from Mijdrecht to the former Wilnis railway station.

According to the Municipality's maps, only the Robert Moulton path is an official name. The intention is apparently to split the Robert Moulton path into two paths, a walking path and a cycle path.

The Robert Moulton path was unveiled on April 29, 2009. The unveiling was made by Canadian Ambassador H.E. Ms. Sabine Nölke and Mayor Maarten Divendal.

Information panels have also been placed with information about, among other things, the attack with the Vickers Wellington on Dortmund in 1943, the crash during the home flight and the crew members F/Sgt Joseph White and F/Sgt Adrien Thibaudeau who also died.

The crew members Sergeant Gordon Carter and F/Sgt Howard Hoddinott survived the crash.

The special honourable mention of pilot Robert Moulton was made because it was established that the pilot attempted an emergency landing to prevent the burning aircraft from crashing in the center of Wilnis. Robert Moulton died as a result.

The Robert Moulton path can therefore also be regarded as a war memorial that should provide the opportunity for commemoration and reflection.

For ,more information, I refer to the article in the RCL magazine edition 2019-04.

I have now expressed my concerns about the Municipality's plans and had a meeting with the alderman in charge.

I put forward the following arguments:

- there is insufficient space for a footpath and in combination with a cycle path;
- the expected influx of bicycles, electric bicycles, fat bikes, all terrain bikes will seriously disrupt the tranquility and peace on the Robert Moulton path;
- cycling traffic can also lead to dangerous situations.

In the meantime multiple organizations, such as: the Cyclists Union, the Walking Network and the National Forestry Network have taken a stand against the construction of a cycle path.

An enthusiastic lady, Kelly Kessen, has set up an action group.

The group, which is against the plans, has already collected more than 1,500 signatures for a petition to be submitted.

Further developments are awaited.

Warrant Officer Robert Benjamin Moulton and his crew have therefore received a lot of extra attention and this will continue for a long time.

Even in this situation, "LEST WE FORGET" will continue to apply. I will keep you informed of the progress.

Mook, September 5, 2023.

Mook War Cemetery is the final resting place for 322 fallen soldiers from the Second World War, located in the Dutch municipality of Mook and Middelaar. The cemetery is maintained by the Commonwealth War Graves Commission.



The 322 fallen come from five different countries, United Kingdom (297), Poland (11), Canada (10), Australia (3) and New Zealand (1)

Early to rise to attend a very special event.

Although an "last minute deployment", we were present with a small delegation from The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 005, 'Liberation of the Netherlands'.

It was the so-called 'rededication' of the grave of Canadian trooper Henry George Johnston of the 1st Canadian Armoured Carrier Regiment also known as 'Kangaroos'.



Many of Henry's relatives, 2 daughters, 3 granddaughters and great-grandson, were present at this ceremony. But also, representatives of various organisations, the Mayor of the municipality, the Canadian Embassy and the Canadian Armed Forces.

Henry was killed on January 17, 1945 in Baakhoven during the opening phase of Operation Blackcock - the Battle of the Roer Triangle. For a long time, Henry was buried as "unknown" in Mook. The research to give this grave eventually a name and a 'face' is a very special story. The ceremony was appropriately closed by a violinist playing "We'll meet again..." by Vera Lynn.

It is very special to be present at such an emotional rededication.

Holten, September 13, 2023.

Indigenous Legacy Ceremony op de CWGC Canadian War Cemetery.

The Canadian Armed Forces had unveiled the first headstones bearing marks of Canada's Indigenous People who died in wartime during a ceremony in 2022. (See edition 2022-06)

There are also many Canadian victims from WW2 buried in the Netherlands. Some of them are also of Indigenous descent.

After many years of researching by comrades Yvonne and Berry Swarthoff in particular, an initiative has been started by The Royal Canadian Legion Branch 005, 'Liberation of the Netherlands' (RCL005) to give concrete substance to the marking of those deceased liberators: the Indigenous Legacy Project was born in the Netherlands.

The first step was to identify the graves in the large CWGC cemeteries (Bergen op Zoom, Groesbeek and Holten).

RCLoo5 President Martin Reelick, as 'half Canadian', has initiated a number of actions based on his passion for the subject, which really started things off. The help of the Holten information center, Radboud University Nijmegen, the NANAI Foundation and Faces-to-Graves was called in to obtain and validate the data of the deceased liberators.

Comrade Herman Sligman is a true researcher and has provided the data and secured communication lines within the project.

From Canada, the help of veteran and Indigenous expert Glenn Miller was indispensable for contacts with Veterans Affairs Canada (VAC) and the various Indigenous groups.

With the approval of the various Indigenous groups in Canada, the graves could be marked. According to specific tradition, this must be done in a ceremony. It also concerns Canadian compatriots, who are buried in a Canadian cemetery in the Netherlands. That is why VAC took the lead in the project for the first ceremony in Holten.

The relatives of the deceased from Canada were invited to attend.

Leaders of Indigenous groups, such as 'Chiefs' and 'Elders', members of the Canadian government, such as the Minister and Deputy Minister of VAC, members of the Canadian Embassy in the Netherlands and others were also invited.

Present from the Netherlands were the Mayor of Holten-Rijssen with four Aldermen and a limited number of guests, who are involved in the project. The Colour Party of RCL005 was also asked to attend.

This action symbolizes communication with 'The Creator'.

In this way they make contact with the deceased, in this case the Canadian native soldiers who fell in the Netherlands.

From there, all the guests received a tuft of tobacco to make their offering.

There were speeches and Indigenous music and songs. A number of wreaths were laid; everything very impressive.

The Canadian relatives visited the graves of their deceased and paid their respect there. sometimes together with the children present. The youth must of course know what had happened and should never happen again.

John Desrosiers, Director, International Operations, Commemoration and Public Affairs of VAC and responsible for, among other things, the activities surrounding the Canadian monument of the First World War in Vimy, France, acted as master of ceremonies.

Partly the ceremony had a private character, the part in which the Indigenous Peoples called on their ancestors to be present in "Spirit".

The ceremony was very personal for those involved. Taking photos or videos was prohibited when the group smoked a pipe with tobacco in a circle in front of the memorial cross at the cemetery.

After the ceremony there was lunch in Mondani restaurant, there were discussions and a number of gifts were exchanged.

N.B. The relatives also visited the CWGC Canadian Cemeteries in Bergen op Zoom and Groesbeek to honour the victims there.


Danny and Toon laid a wreath on behalf of RCL Branch 005. Amanda and Maikel assisted the organization during the ceremony.

CWGC Airborne War Cemetery Arnhem Oosterbeek. Tuesday, September 19, 2023.

More than 1,750 Allied soldiers are buried at the Airborne Cemetery on the Van Limburg Stirumweg in Oosterbeek. These men and boys died during the Battle of Arnhem.

On Sunday, September 17, 2023, they were commemorated with great honour in the presence of veterans, relatives and many interested parties.

We previously paid attention in a newsletter to the Canadian CANLOAN officers who participated in Operation Market Garden and to a number of them who found a final resting place here. (Edition 2021-08)

On Tuesday, September 19, 2023, there was an additional ceremony in memory of a Dutch victim, who found his final resting place here.

The organization was in the hands of the Dutch Commando Troops Corps (KCT).



Commemorated and honoured:

A.M. Bakhuis Rozeboom.

He emigrated to Canada with his parents. On July 2, 1942 he was conscripted into the Dutch troops.

After the commando training, he was posted to No 2 Dutch Troop.

During Operation Market Garden he was assigned to the 1st British Airborne Division.

In the evening of September 19, 1944, he left the 'Hartenstein' hotel in a jeep together with British paratroopers and resistance fighter H. Beekhuizen. The intention was to contact the paratroop battalion at the Rhine Bridge in Arnhem.

However, that failed and they returned to Oosterbeek. In passing, a German Red Cross car, which turned out to be full of weapons, was captured. Just after the viaduct west of Arnhem, the jeep came under fire. Bakhuis Roozeboom, standing between the driver and co-driver, fired his Tommy gun and threw hand grenades at the Germans. Suddenly he collapsed, fatally struck.

The others managed to return to Oosterbeek by jeep, where Bakhuis Roozeboom was buried in the garden of hotel 'Hartenstein'.

Later, August Bakhuis Roozeboom was buried as 'Known unto God' at the Airborne War Cemetery Oosterbeek.

After a lengthy investigation, the grave of Bakhuis Roozeboom could be located in 1996.

On May 5, 1997, in the presence of, among others, comrades-in-arms from No. 2 Dutch Troop paid tribute at his grave and said goodbye to August Bakhuis Roozeboom.

As a tribute, the tent camp where all commandos receive their elementary training is named after him.

Flanders has gained an impressive chunk of UNESCO heritage. The World Heritage Committee has officially recognised Flanders' World War I memorial sites as world heritage sites. This includes 27 monuments and cemeteries, such as Tyne Cot Cemetery in Passchendaele and the Menin Gate in Ypres.

These commemorative sites are the backbone of Flanders Fields, a region that was a battleground of the First World War for four years. The many monuments you will find here today symbolise a universal message of peace. They fit into a collection of 139 historical memorials in Flanders (27), Wallonia (16) and France (96). That collection is now recognised as world heritage in its entirety.

With this recognition, UNESCO has designated a material world heritage site in Flanders for the eighth time. Among other things, the historic city centre of Bruges and the centuries-old printing and publishing company Plantin-Moretus in Antwerp have already featured on this prestigious list. So, this list now includes the Flanders Fields memorials as well. These monuments were already protected by the Flemish community. There is now an additional honour and responsibility, so that this invaluable heritage is preserved for eternity.

White Ribbon Mile, Oosterbeek. Monday evening, September 25, 2023.

Heavy rain, pitch dark and shelling.

More than 2,300 young men from the defeated British First Airborne Division tried to cross the Lower Rhine between Oosterbeek and Driel during the night of September 25 to 26, 1944. It was raining heavily and it was pitch dark, because the public lighting was no longer functioning. And there was the constant danger of enemy shelling.

On the night of September 25 to 26, 1944, the British 1st Airborne Division withdrew from the perimeter in Oosterbeek. The soldiers walked along white ribbons in the dark to the Rhine where they went by boat or swimming to the southern bank.

How different it is on a Monday evening in 2023, when a group of people walk the same route to commemorate the courage of these Polish and British soldiers. The weather is pleasant and in the distance the street lights sparkle in Driel and in the Schuytgraaf district of Arnhem

Just like then, white ribbons have been strung to mark the route to the river. Although the ribbons are not now, as they were then, made from strips of parachute fabric. Even now they show the way from the Oude Kerk in Oosterbeek to the Rhine.



The group walks the 'White Ribbon Mile' in silence. This tour is traditionally the last in the series of commemorations surrounding the Battle of Arnhem in the municipality of Renkum.

And, we were in the fortunate circumstances of being able to visit most of them at the time. Veterans in the past, and now their children and grandchildren.

But 'chance encounters' at the Memory Freedom Museum in Nijverdal, at RCL Branch 005 in Lochem and at the Canadian War Cemeteries have also resulted in Canadian friendships.

How special it is to be invited on the first day of our holiday by friends for a tour of the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry Heritage Museum.

The museum is housed in The Lieutenant-Colonel John Weir Foote, VC, CD Armoury in the middle of Hamilton.





In addition to the Royal Hamilton Light Infantry (Wentworth Regiment), the Argyll & Sutherland Highlanders of Canada, (Princess Louise's), 11th Battery, 11th Field regiment RCA, 31 signal Regiment and 31 (Hamilton) Service Battalion housed in this armoury.

At 10:00 a.m., Maj. Michael (Mike) Rehill CD ret., together with his wife, is already waiting for us at the gate of the barracks. How small can the world be if it turns out that Mike's wife is from the Netherlands, that we are peers and were also born in the same place.



Through the courtyard we enter a huge hall where the camp beds are neatly laid out.

Up the stairs, and with Mike as key holder in the lead, we enter a number of rooms that house a huge amount of relics. At the 100th anniversary of the Riley's, a book was also published about the history of the regiment 'Semper Paratus'.




In 2012, the regiment celebrated its 150th anniversary. Forty-three Battle Honours have been awarded to the regiment over the

'The Fighting Rileys', the history is shown in detail.








