
The flags are there for such a situation, but the bearers are currently missing.

February 4, 2024. Commemoration Kapelsche Veer.

The tree that saw everything...


On Sunday afternoon, February 4, 2024, comrades Gerrit Bruggink, Reinier Groeneveld, Ad van Uffelen and the undersigned were present at the commemoration of the soldiers who died in the battle for Kapelsche Veer 79 years ago. Known as Operation Elephant.



An attack by the First Canadian Army on a narrow island north of the Meuse River, in which various nationalities fought on the Allied side.

A battle lasting about 1 month, which started just before Christmas 1944 and left approximately 400 dead and missing among Poles, Norwegians, Belgians, British and Canadians.

It is estimated that there were approximately 500 German casualties. So a very fierce battle. The battle for Kapelsche Veer can be assumed to be well known.



"Commemoration literally means remembering again," said Mr. Jack Didden, author of historical WW2 books and one of the speakers during the ceremony.

And that is what we did on behalf of RCL005.

The commemoration took place at the monument on the Veerweg, located in front of an old weeping willow.

A weeping willow that was already there in 1944, in other words: 'the tree that saw everything'.

This time the ceremony was mainly focused on the Poles who fought here.

It was also the opening of the 80th anniversary celebration of 'the glorious advance of General Stanislaw Maczek's 1s^t Polish Armoured Division'.

His grave is located on the Polish cemetery on the Ettensebaan in Breda, where the memorial is also located.

Definitely worth a visit!

There were several Polish delegates and dignitaries, including some high-ranking officers of the Polish Army.

The guard of honour was formed by members of the Polish Mountain battalion in beautiful uniforms with capes/cloaks and hats with feathers. Striking and special to me was the Edelweiss

emblem on the mantle.





In the morning program there was a lecture about the history of these Mountain Hunters.



And also, in the morning program, flowers were laid at the grave of Lieutenant Leon Czertok – officer of the $1^{\rm st}$ Polish Armoured Division – who was the first to die in the battle for Kapelsche Veer. This grave is located at the Jewish cemetery in Den Hout.

We were not present at the morning program ourselves.

This time the organization of this commemoration was in the hands of:

Polish Roman Catholic Parish of Saint Maximilian Maria Kolbe Breda and the Polish Historical Memory Group. Also involved:

Association 1st Polish Armoured Division Netherlands, Jewish Community of Breda, Reenactment group Breda 1944,Pheasant Foundation, Association Kryptonim T-IV and Polish military delegations

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A wreath was laid at the monument on behalf of the Royal Canadian Legion Branch 005.

Afterwards there was an informal gathering in restaurant 'De Dreef' in Dongen.

There we were warmly welcomed by the organization and treated to a Polish buffet.

The buffet was provided by the wife and daughter of Mr. Witold Gudys from "Polska Grupa Pamieci Hystorycznej".

What a beautiful and worthy commemoration!
What a battle was fought at Kapelsche Veer!

We will remember them!



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
February 8, 2024. Commemoration Operation Veritable.

Organisation: Groesbeek Airborne Friends. This year's theme: The Royal Canadian Engineers.

After the fighting for the Scheldt estuary had come to an end - it was mid-November 1944 - more Canadian engineering units came to this region.

During the winter months, their main task was building bridges and repairing roads.

Important work in view of the upcoming and decisive offensive towards the Rhineland in February 1945.





There were many visitors.

GROESBEEK - commemoration of Operation Veritable February 8, 2024 Participation of 'youngsters' in the commemoration.

It was cold and stormy weather, as we are used to at the commemoration of Operation Veritable at the Canadian cemetery in Groesbeek.

This time ice water also fell down from the sky, but everyone survived that well. Put on a thick winter coat or a beautiful red trench coat and you can withstand any weather situation.



In this way Danny Murphy, Poppy Chairman and Suzanne Groeneveld, member of the Youth Auxiliary, had armed themselves. Both are (youth) members of the Royal Canadian Legion, Liberation of the Netherlands, Branch 005.

Danny has been a long-term member of RCL005, now 84 years young and has been an initiator and/or participant in many commemorations in Groesbeek, but also elsewhere.

Suzanne, now 15 years old, shows enormous curiosity and commitment to the background of the sacrifice that our liberators made for our freedom.

Like every year, the commemoration was well organized and in addition to all the guests, including the Canadian Ambassador to the Netherlands, His Excellency Hugh Adsett, the Youth Department of the Groesbeek Airborne Friends also participated in the commemoration this year.

The collaboration between them and the Youth Auxiliary of RCL005 was enthusiastic and therefore excellent. Commemoration is increasingly a topic that young people are also concerned with.



The Canadian Remembrance Torch, an important part of the RCL005 Youth Auxiliary in the commemoration of fallen Canadian soldiers, was carried in by Suzanne Groeneveld during the "March on the Colours" next to the Colour Party of RCL005.

Thereafter lit by Sven Reijnen, a member of the Youth Department of the Groesbeek Airborne Friends.





The 'Commitment to Remember' was then read in a special "Youth version" by Elin Kuijper (Dutch) and Suzanne Groeneveld (English).

The involvement of the young people was a relief. Our older-youngster Danny Murphy thought so too. As a Canadian veteran and member of the Board of RCL005, he is very involved in the many commemorations he has attended in his life.

He always encourages young people to participate and think about why and for what purposes commemorations should still take place.

During the ceremony at Groesbeek, for the victims of Operation Veritable, he and Suzanne Groeneveld laid a wreath at the monument and they saluted.

THE JUNO BEACH CENTRE RECOGNIZES NS(NB)R VETERAN LT GERALD MORAN

In preparation for the 80_{th} Anniversary of D-Day, June 6, 2024, the Juno Beach Centre in Normandy, France has recently opened a Faces of Canada Today exhibit which focuses on the contribution of Canadian veterans after combat.





One of the veterans chosen for this exhibit is Lt Gerald Moran who served with the North Shore (New Brunswick) Regiment.

Gerald landed with the regiment on D-Day, was seriously wounded on the beach, and was evacuated to England.

The war was now over for Lt. Moran, but he continued to make use of his exceptional skill as a radio operator and instructor.

For many years after the war, and well into retirement, Gerald operated a Ham Radio system that connected Canadians soldiers, serving in combat, and in peacekeeping missions around the world, with family at home in Canada.

This service was provided at no cost.

On Christmas Day at the Moran home, no presents could be unpacked until all calls from overseas had been connected.

Retired Lt Gerald Moran in his home broadcast studio in Fredericton, New Brunswick, connects Canadian soldiers from all over the world to their families and friends back home.

For more than a year and a half, Ad van Uffelen investigated the crash of a Canadian bomber near "de Posthoorn" in Rucphen. He obtained valuable information from conversations with residents of Rucphen and a diary of the De Rooy family.

This gave him a clear picture of the 6th Bomber Command, and specifically of the crew of the Halifax W1271.

The research is now available in the form of a book for interested parties.

Meanwhile, Comrade Ad van Uffelen has started another investigation. On June 22, 1943, a Vickers Wellington (HE981) from the 429 squadron of No. 6 Bomber Command crashed near the Langeweg (Oudenbosch-NL).

The entire (Canadian) crew: F/O Pilot John L.F. Lown, navigator Sgt Arthur J. Sieffert, bomb aimer Sgt John K. Wood, radio operator and gunner F/Sgt Albert S. Rhodes and gunner W/O II William H. Calder were killed.

In memory of Edward Underwood. Grave VI.E.2.

The family of Edward, who died on November 17, 1945, has presented a work of art to the information center.

The Underwood family is a First Nations family of the Tsawout Band from Saanichton on Vancouver Island, British Columbia.

The artwork was created by First Nation and tribal member Doug LaFortune. It has been given a worthy place in the corridor of the information center.



In the photo you can see the hand over of the painting by Dr. Bettina van Hoven. She is affiliated with the University of Groningen and contact person for the Tsawout Band in the Netherlands.

Pte Edward Underwood

Edward werd geboren op 15 september 1918 als zoon van Bert en Ellen Underwood uit Saanichton British Columbia. Zijn broers waren Benjamin, George en Harry Underwood en zijn zusters: Adeline, Marjory, Bertha, Mary, Esther, Bernadette en Patricia Underwood.

Hij was een Indiaan van de Tsawoutstam vanwege de afkomst van beide ouders.

Hij was visser en lid van the Methodist Church. Hij nam op 20 september 1939 dienst in Victoria British Columbia en ging op 2 september 1941 overzee naar het Verenigd Koninkrijk.

Op 3 juli 1944 maakte hij de oversteek naar Normandië. Met zijn onderdeel, het Canadian Scottish Regiment, nam hij deel aan de verdere opmars door NW Europa.



Edward stierf op woensdag 17 november 1945 op de leeftijd van 27 jr. aan de gevolgen van een spoedoperatie wegens complicaties bij een tuberculosebesmetting in een Canadees hospitaal in Oldenburg (Duitsland). Hij werd tijdelijk begraven in Osterscheps (Duitsland) voordat hij op 6 maart 1946 werd herbegraven in Holten.

Toegekend werden hem de volgende onderscheidingen: 1939-1945 Star; France Germany Star; Defence Medal; War Medal en de Canadian Volunteer Service Medal met Clasp.







2 female Inuit pilots made history flying together. They hope it's a start.

'Seeing somebody who looks like you and is like you is important,' says pilot from Inukjuak

Melissa Haney and Zoe Kroonenburg have flown from Montreal to Puvirnituq, in the northern Quebec region of Nunavik, hundreds of times.

But Tuesday's (Feb.06-2024) two-and-a-half-hour cargo flight, with Haney as the captain and Kroonenburg as first officer aboard the Air Inuit Boeing 737, felt different. It was the first time either of them had flown alongside someone who looked like them.

'Representation does matter,' said Haney.

'It's something that I've been waiting for for a long time — to have two female Inuit pilots up front. So I was excited for this day to come.'
It took 20 years for Haney.



Air Inuit says Kroonenburg and Haney's latest trip north was the first time a female Inuk captain and copilot flew a 737 together for Air Inuit.

When she started flying in 2004 for Air Inuit, Haney was the only female Inuk pilot — and the first ever female Air Inuit captain.

Now, there are four female Inuit pilots among the 220 pilots working for the airline.

A bell crosses the ocean.

The Welberg Liberation Monument Foundation received a beautiful specimen.

An approximately 70 centimeter high bronze bell that had served for years in a nursing home in Roosendaal turned up in a depot.

This bell will travel across the ocean to the Algonquin Regiment in Ontario.

This unit played an important role in the liberation of Steenbergen and the surrounding area.

In 2014, the foundation also donated a bell to the South Alberta Light Horse Regiment. It is customary that the bells in Welberg and Alberta are being rung simultaneously during the annual commemoration early November.

The intention is that in due course the bell in Ontario will also sound at the same time. First, volunteers will make a bell chair.

In November this year it will be rung next to the bell in Welberg.
